BACKGROUND

Your Middleton Library has recently received 35 years of documents, photographs and oral history developed by Villager Historian Nancy Long.

Genesis 1 v 1-4

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness.

Hymn 252 - "Inspired by Love and Anger" verses 1,2 and 4

Inspired by love and anger, disturbed by need and pain, aware of God's own bias, we ask him once again:
"How long must some folk suffer? How long can few folk mind?
How long dare vain self-interest turn prayer and pity blind?"

From those forever victims of heartless human greed,
Their cruel plight composes a litany of need:
"Where are the fruits of justice? Where are the signs of peace?
When is the day when prisoners and dreams find their release?"

To God, who through the prophets proclaimed a different age, We offer earth's indifference, its agony and rage: "When will the wronged by righted? When will the kingdom come? When will the world be generous to all instead of some?"

Thought for the Day

I can't believe that, as I felt the need to make observations about the tragedy unfolding in Turkey and Syria, one of the readings this Sunday is the creation story.

As one clergyman I knew well would have said "if you think this is a coincidence may you live a very dull life" I think I agree with him.

Earthquakes are part of earths ongoing evolution. God made the earth and all that is in it, yet there will be some people who will be saying God sends earthquakes deliberately to punish the people living in those regions, others will say this is so horrendous there can't be a God. I disagree very strongly with both of these views.

As we read the Creation story, we can't fail to see the beauty of the process. I would always go along with the scientists on the time scale of evolution, but I am in awe of the understanding of whoever wrote Genesis, of the accuracy of the sequence of the development of life.

The whole rhythm of the sequence of evolution and harmony inspires me. We as humans were given the task of stewarding it all and given both exploring minds and the free will to use them responsibly. What got in the way?

Another of today's readings tells us of Jesus instructions to "remember the lilies of the field" (Mathew 8: 25–End)

It seems to me that Jesus called us to follow his example to care for all of creation, to love everyone, to never judge, to always seek justice, to be compassionate, always put others before ourselves. Ours is not to question why but to pray for all who suffer and work towards the development of a more caring and passionate world.

Prayer

Lord Jesus come among us. Inspire us to be bold and speak out for the exploited. Give us the compassion that can send a blanket of your love over all that suffer. **Amen**
