
Marion Cooper

Reading: Paul's Letter to the Romans chapter 5 v 1 - 5

Thought for the Day:

St Paul is our great teacher of the faith for several reasons. Before Jesus spoke to him personally and dramatically on the Damascus road, he had been on completely the wrong track. He was persecuting Christians and upholding the strict Jewish law of Moses. After he had heard the voice of Jesus, he went away on his own for three years contemplating his calling from God to minister to non-Jews, so called Gentiles, that is of course people like us, not part of the Jewish race. He speaks to us today in the light of the Holy Spirit of God who called him. And he tells us in this passage the astounding revelation - all we need for eternal life is a confession of faith and belief in the heart. **Rev Carolyn Oley 6.3.2022**
